My name is Norbert Tan. My family has lived in Ventura County for 18-years. We are currently 13-year residents of the South Bank neighborhood in North Oxnard, CA. I serve as the Deputy Director of the Asian Pacific Policy & Planning Council (A3PCON) in Los Angeles. A3PCON is a member of two multiracial coalitions advocating for equitable representation for communities of color in the redistricting process: the People's Bloc and the AAPI & AMEMSA State Redistricting Collaborative. Currently, I commute to downtown Los Angeles 2-4 times a month. I also work remotely and travel within Los Angeles and Ventura County for my nonprofit consulting clients and executive coaching clients.

Geographically, South Bank is bound by the 101 freeway to the north, North Ventura Road to the west, Vineyard Avenue to the south, and North Oxnard Blvd to the east.

Our neighborhood is made up of a range of lower middle class to upper middle-class residents, living in apartments and single-family homes. Many of the single-family homes have multiple-generations living together. Our residents range from migrant workers to health care workers to professionals with advanced degrees.

Our immediate neighborhood has an elementary school, park, and cemetery, but is flanked by RiverRidge Golf Course, the Collection, the Esplanade Towers and retail center.

Our neighborhood is predominantly made up of Latinx residents. Spanish is widely spoken. The City of Oxnard hosts various festivals, like the Strawberry Festival and the Salsa Festival.

The Oxnard school districts and Haas Automation are the largest employers in our area.

Oxnard College, Ventura College, and Cal State Channel Islands are the major higher education institutions in our area.

Most residents travel by car and bus. There is Amtrak service through Oxnard.

Some of the major issues facing our neighborhood is:

- 1) The unhoused living in the Santa Clara Riverbank.
- 2) Housing affordability
- 3) Environmental effects stemming from the floods and wildfires.
- General recovery from the pandemic.

I would urge any redistricting commission to keep the boundaries of Oxnard whole because of the unique challenges and opportunities that come from having such a diverse populations defined by such definite boundaries. The vibrant mix of agriculture, retail, education, tourism, and technology industries in Oxnard continue to make it the largest and most economically powerful city in the county. It's important to me to have elected officials who can rise to the challenge of representing a community.

# RE: Redistricting Comments from the City of Moorpark

Dear Board of Supervisors:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments as you go through the redistricting process following the 2020 Census. As a public agency with City Councilmembers elected by district, we understand and commend the County's efforts to solicit feedback from stakeholders throughout the County as you identify communities of interest and, ultimately, districts.

The City of Moorpark offers the following comments to help inform your redistricting process:

# **Comment 1: Moorpark Should Be Entirely Located in One District**

As enshrined in state law, "Cities should be kept together where possible." Moorpark has historically benefitted from having a single point of contact on the Board of Supervisors who carries the weight of all Moorpark residents. This is preferable to being split into smaller portions of multiple districts.

# **Comment 2: Moorpark Should Be Located in a Southeast-County District**

Due to the proximity, physical geography, and freeway system in Ventura County, Moorpark has closer ties to the southeastern Ventura County cities of Simi Valley and Thousand Oaks than it does to other communities in western Ventura County (such as Camarillo) and in the Heritage Valley (such as Santa Paula and Fillmore).

There are numerous governmental examples recognizing the close ties between Moorpark, Simi Valley, and Thousand Oaks. Moorpark City Transit buses and vans are operated by the City of Thousand Oaks. The buses are stored overnight and refueled at the City of Simi Ventura County Redistricting Comments Page 2

Valley Transit Maintenance Facility located a mere mile from Moorpark's city limits. Within the Southern California Association of Governments, our district consists of Moorpark, Simi Valley, and Thousand Oaks. In fact, our region is currently represented by a Moorpark City Councilmember.

Given the current demographics and locations of population centers within Ventura County, I am confident that you can and will create a fair, equitable district map that incorporates our two comments and ensures that the voting rights of Moorpark and Ventura County residents will be respected for the next decade and beyond. I look forward to seeing the County's efforts to accomplish this in the coming months.

# What are the common interests in your community? Describe why they are important to you.

We are concerned about the environment, wild life, open space, and protecting our single family neighborhood from being swallowed by too much growth in our back yards being contemplated by the City of Thousand Oaks. Business interests are taking over. We want our residential, suburban lifestyle to remain intact. We are hard working people, many in skilled trades, fire and police, teachers, administrators, managers and support staff. Many long term residents and stability. Our homes are over 50 years old. We will need infrastructure improvements—sewers, streets, we have too many power outages and old above ground poles, lack choices for cable/media/communications. We have too much traffic on the 101, We do not have any public transit that goes where people need to go when they need it. We need services 24/7, our traffic on the freeway is just as congested, maybe more so than on weekdays. If more homes are built near us, our streets will be completely clogged and we won't be able to get to and from our homes and suffer from noise pollution, traffic, and trash. We will lose visiting wild life like raccoons, hawks, owls, possums, and other creatures that maintain balance in our ecosystem. Our arroyo will be polluted and water fowl will die off or leave. We will be left with rats, mosquitos and a sick environment that will harm our health. Important to us that we continue to have a supervisor who cares about our unincorporated tract and that our needs are met and represented to the Board of Supervisors.

Where is your community? What are the cross streets and/or landmarks in your neighborhood? (For example, intersections, roads, rivers, etc.)

I live in Casa Conejo, an unicorporated tract of 900 homes in Newbury Park surrounded by the City of Thousand Oaks. We are bordered by the 101 Fwy on the North, Borchard Rd on the South, Jenny Drive on the West, and Strauss and Virginia to the East. Primary access is Wendy Drive which divides the East and West sides of the tract. I can ONLY access my home by taking either Bella or Alice and other streets to Wendy Drive.

Our community is not part of a City. Ventura County Board of Supervisors is our only direct governing body. # What are the common interests in your community? Describe why they are important to you.

My name is Laura Espinosa, President of Santa Paula Latino Town Hall. We welcome the opportunity to offer public comment during the Redistricting Process. We are based in Santa Paula but have membership throughout the County and the Santa Clara Valley. First you should know that Santa Paula has a history of voter dilution that prevented it from electing its' candidate of choice in the city and county wide races. In 2002 Santa Paula settled a U.S. Department of Justice lawsuit that resulted in the city's admission that the Latino community was unable to elect its' candidate of choice. This is legal decision that documents that voting was racially polarized. The Board of Supervisors has never had a Latino representative in the past 100 year history from the Santa Clara Valley of Santa Paula, Fillmore and Piru.

# Communities of Interest

Our 3rd District Valley lies along the Santa Clara River, the last remaining wild river in California. It is connected by agriculture production and workers that generate millions of dollars in crop production. Yet do not receive an equitable share of those proceeds. It is anchored by Catholic churches in Piru, San Salvador Mission, St. Francis of Assisi in Fillmore, Our Lady of Guadalupe and St. Sebastian in Santa Paula and Sacred Heart in Saticoy along the 126 freeway.

Its socio-economic conditions, social determinants of health and poverty rates are all similar, 16%-19% range often cited has the highest in the County of Ventura as compared to 6.9% in Camarillo, a city we would like to have removed from the District as there is little community of interest shared with the predominately white, wealthy community with many upscale shops. Latinos make up the highest percentage of the population in the SCV. We are a young population and there are a large number of individuals without legal status which contributes to the lack of voter strength.

Some may describe us as quaint Main Street, with corner Mom and Pop Mexican markets and bakeries, 99 cent stores, and cart vendors. We are unique. We celebrate many festivals such as Santo Nino de Atocha that attracts thousands of Catholic believers throughout California, De Colores cultural arts festival, Labor Day parade, Veterans events, Chamber of Commerce street fairs with music and handcraft sales and car shows. Little League and Boys and Girls Club activities are the few youth activities available. Teen activities are almost non-existent.

There is a sweat lodge on Telegraph Road that runs the entire SCV Valley where indigenous practices are followed. There is a Purepecha enclave located in Santa Paula, an indigenous community from Michoacán, Mexico. They are a tribe never conquered by the mighty Aztecs.

The Santa Clara Valley often relies on service clubs and non-profits for supportive services. We have been united during the pandemic for the highest numbers of Covid 19 illness and lowest rates of vaccinations. During the months of July and August of 2021, alone, there were over 1,000 applications for rental assistance in Santa Paula.

We are a community of resilient activists that fought to reopen the Santa Paula Hospital, twice! The coalition of SPLTH and Santa Clara Valley Together, made up of SCV residents, has fought for the expansion of the Ventura Community College East Campus Center following the inability to have effective representation on the College Board that follows the 3rd District boundaries. We fight for expanded mental health services.

The community also successfully fought a hazardous waste facility, but unfortunately is easy prey for other unpleasant things facing communities of color such as the Toland Road Dump and the Todd Road Jail.

Both Sespe and Cabrillo Village have connection to the Santa Clara Valley and farm worker resistance to poor and oppressive working and living conditions and were both successful in developing farmworker driven housing. A sense of pride, hard work and self-determination are common traits among Latino families.

#### Change Needed

In order to have fair representation, the 3rd district must change. Regardless of having voted in every election, the majority Latino populace has never seen a person like me elected to the Board of Supervisors although we make up 80% of the population. We believe by removing Camarillo and adding Cabrillo Village, Saticoy, El Rio, Nyeland Acres, North Oxnard (north of Plaza Park and bordered to the West by Victoria Avenue and to the East by El Rio) we would have a District that shares our communities of interest.

The iconic Bank in Saticoy was once known as the Mercantile Bank of Santa Paula. Saticoy's population is 87% Latino. In 1976 Farmworker families bought their humble cottages from Saticoy Lemon Association. This was the first time U.S. farmworkers purchased the camp they lived in. Many of the Saticoy, Cabrillo and East Ventura families have grown children and relatives who live in surrounding Santa Paula, Fillmore, Piru, and El Rio, North Oxnard.

State Route 118 curves thru Southerly portion of the town site of Saticoy and heads northwest as Wells Road terminates at Santa Paula Freeway. Saticoy is near an apex of an alluvial fan formed by the Santa Clara River and Calleguas Creek. The Santa Clara river Valley opens up into the Oxnard Plain. South Mountain on the South shore marks the end of the Valley.

We respectfully seek your full review of the additions we seek to create a new 3rd District that will allow full voting rights to an underserved community with little political power as it currently stands.

I also believe that the more affluent communities like Simi Valley and Thousand Oaks should not be grouped together with Oxnard as their population and community needs differ vastly from ours.

# What else would you like to tell us about your community?

I recommend that you do not split up La Colonia or South Oxnard, these Latino communities that have long been underrepresented and need their voting rights to be protected. I would also recommend that La Colonia and South Oxnard should also be grouped in the district, because of their shared demographics.

I also recommend that South Oxnard and Port Hueneme be grouped together since both regions share a High School that youth from both regions attend and also have a high concentration of latino residents and the working class. Most residents don't know that they are living in two different regions due to the size of Port Hueneme.

Oxnard has historically been a stronghold for a Latino, immigrant and farm worker community and there is a sense of shared community and culture. Many like myself come from families that have worked and continue to work in agriculture. Families like mine have made great contributions to the local culture and economy and deserve to be represented by individuals who understand their unique needs. My community deserves to represented by someone who understands the need for support for immigrant, Latino families in the agricultural sector. This includes someone who can understand the need for affordable housing, quality education, and preserving the local rich Latinx culture.

Where is your community? What are the cross streets and/or landmarks in your neighborhood? (For example, intersections, roads, rivers, etc.)

My community includes South Oxnard, Port Hueneme, and La Colonia.

# Why is it important for your community to be included in the County of Ventura Board of Supervisors redistricting process? Please describe how the issues that the Board of Supervisors considers have an impact on your community.

It is important that this community to be included in the redistricting process as South Oxnard and La Colonia share many of the same characteristics including ethnic backgrounds and residents of the same socioeconomic status. There are also many youth who have attending school in both communities, including myself. Many residents from these areas are often transporting back and forth for work and school. South Oxnard should also be with Port Hueneme as they share a connection with the Naval Base and the Port. Many residents including myself also attend school from both areas, as well as travel between both areas for work. For many, the line that separated the cities of Port Hueneme and South Oxnard are blurred and consider it the same community.

# What else would you like to tell us about your community?

Because Oxnard has more population than one district, it must be split into more than one district. When dividing Oxnard, it is preferable to put North Oxnard with Camarillo because they are more similar economically and demographically, and more connected to each other along the 101. North Oxnard is more middle-class than South Oxnard, has many newer developments, and many residents are second-generation Mexican-American rather than first-generation immigrants, all of which make it more similar to Camarillo than South Oxnard. Many residents of South Oxnard like myself have a strong sense of pride, as many of our families began their lives here and share the same pride in the lives they have made here as first-generation Mexican-Americans.

Public transportation also connects the cities and their residents.

At the County of Ventura Community Redistricting Meeting on August 31, 2021 you received public comment from Assemblymember and former District 1 Supervisor Steve Bennett. Assemblymember Bennett stated he feels strongly that Ojai and Ventura have a strong community of interest because both cities are connected by the Ventura River water source and Highway 33. The City of Ojai agrees with, and supports Assemblymember Bennett's statement.

The definition of a Community of Interest is a contiguous population that shares common social and economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation. The City of Ojai and Ventura meet this criteria, and should remain in District 1.

Honorable Board of Supervisors:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments as you go through the redistricting process following the 2020 Census. As a public agency with City Councilmembers elected by district, we understand and commend the County's efforts to solicit feedback from stakeholders throughout the County as you establish Supervisorial districts for the next ten years.

On September 1, the City of Moorpark provided two comments to the Board of Supervisors as it engaged in its redistricting process:

#### Comment 1: Moorpark Should Be Entirely Located in One District. Comment 2: Moorpark Should Be Located in a Southeast-County District.

While the County's Draft Redistricting Maps 2, 3, and 4 all fully respect both comments, County **Draft Redistricting Map 1 is not consistent with comments expressed by the City of Moorpark**. Map 1 would combine roughly the eastern half of Moorpark with a Simi Valley-centric district that also includes eastern Thousand Oaks and Oak Park, which notably would only be accessible to the principal portions of the district by crossing through the central of three districts that Thousand Oaks would be split into. Meanwhile, the western half of Moorpark would be located in a Heritage Valley-centric district that would extend all the way to El Rio and eastern Oxnard.

Moorpark is the sixth-largest city among Ventura County's ten incorporated cities, with roughly half the population of fifth-place Camarillo. Bisecting Moorpark across two districts would further diminish and erode the ability for Moorpark residents and businesses to be

represented in countywide policy development because Moorpark would represent only a very small portion of any individual Supervisor's constituency.

Map 1 would also present major challenges to communications and partnerships that Moorpark currently enjoys through its partnership and attention from a single specific Supervisor. This is perhaps most clearly seen in the regional responses to the COVID-19 pandemic. As an example, Supervisor Huber formed a Business Recovery Task Force to coordinate business assistance and retention efforts in Moorpark and Simi Valley, partnering with the Cities of Moorpark and Simi Valley and the respective Moorpark and Simi Valley Chambers of Commerce. By leveraging the close ties between the two communities, the Task Force coordinated personal protective equipment (PPE) distribution to businesses, conveyed coordinated business opening/closure communications to businesses, and conducted shop local campaigns, among other activities. If Map 1 were to be adopted, such an effort would be extremely difficult to coordinate logistically because Moorpark would need to coordinate with officials and business interests in Simi Valley, Thousand Oaks, Camarillo, Oxnard, Santa Paula, and Fillmore in order to secure the same program.

During the California Redistricting Commission's multiple hearings thus far for California's Congressional Districts, State Senate Districts, and State Assembly Districts, dozens of public commenters from Oxnard, El Rio, and the Heritage Valley expressed a desire for those communities to be separated from the southeastern County communities of Moorpark, Camarillo, and Thousand Oaks. Recognizing the demographic and suburban/rural/ agricultural differences between the communities, those speakers worried that their voting power would be diminished by spreading them out among other communities. Map 1 would run contrary to those concerns.

Fortunately, the County has three other draft Maps for its consideration, and **Moorpark stridently encourages the Board of Supervisors to select from Maps 2, 3, and 4** as it continues through its redistricting process. Each of these maps fully respects the comments I provided to the Board of Supervisors last month – to keep Moorpark entirely within one district and to keep Moorpark in a Southeast-County District that reflects its geographic and jurisdictional ties to adjacent communities.

Dear Chair Parks and Board:

As your Board considers the new Census data and redistricting options for Ventura County, the Santa Rosa Valley Municipal Advisory Council (MAC) strongly recommends that our community of Santa Rosa Valley, as represented by the MAC boundaries approved by the Board on November 6, 2012 (attached), remain in its entirety and within the Second Supervisorial District. Santa Rosa Valley is a community with like needs with it's adjoining neighbor to the east, the City of Thousand Oaks, in terms of transportation connectivity, municipal facilities, recreation and open space.

Many areas of Santa Rosa Valley are contiguous with Thousand Oaks and the City owns land at the entrances of Moorpark Road and at Hill Canyon Road. The Norwegian Grade section of Moorpark Road is owned by the City right up to the intersection at Santa Rosa Road and serves as the main entrance into Santa Rosa Valley from Thousand Oaks. Additionally, the City's Hill Canyon Treatment Plant is only accessed through Santa Rosa Valley.

The southern boundary of Santa Rosa Valley is Wildwood Park and Hill Canyon, which is managed by the Conejo Open Space Conservation Agency (COSCA), a Joint Powers Authority with the City of Thousand Oaks and the Conejo Recreation (CRPD). Santa Rosa Valley and COSCA share open space areas, hiking, biking and equestrian trails, as well as a parking agreement with the County Parks Department that allows for free parking at the County's Santa Rosa Valley Regional Park. The City also owns agricultural land in Santa Rosa Valley and has authorized the use of a trail along that land so people can easily connect to the park.

In sum, both Santa Rosa Valley and the City of Thousand Oaks have key facilities accessed through each other's jurisdictions, have important shared agreements for trails and parking, and are geographically linked by a common recreational area. On September 16, 2021, the MAC unanimously voted to send a recommendation to your Board respectfully asking that as you work toward drawing new Supervisorial districts for Ventura County, you maintain the integrity of Santa Rosa Valley and allow our community to remain in District 2.

Honorable Chair and Members of the Board of Supervisors:

On October 5, 2021, I sent a letter on behalf of the Oxnard City Council outlining the four principles that the City Council wished to see incorporated into the supervisorial redistricting process that is ongoing at this time.

Six days later, the County of Ventura released four draft supervisorial maps prepared by the County's demographer. The press release announcing the release of the four maps indicated that these maps are intended to provide an initial set of options or a baseline for consideration by the Board of Supervisors regarding the redistricting process. The press release also indicated that the draft maps followed the Fair Maps Act (Elections Code Section 21500 *et seq.*).

Unfortunately, based upon the City's review of these four maps, the maps prepared by the County's demographer (identified as Plans 1, 2, 3 and 4) do not meet the City Council's four principles, which are based upon the requirements of Elections Code Section 21500.

Specifically, Plans 1, 2 and 3 do not meet the City Council's principles because they:

1. Do not respect the geographic integrity of local neighborhoods and communities of interest in Oxnard by dividing a number of established neighborhoods between two or more proposed supervisorial districts;

2. Do not respect the geographical integrity of Oxnard by unnecessarily dividing Oxnard into three supervisorial districts (Plans 1 and 2) or four supervisorial districts (Plan 3);

3. Do not respect the geographical integrity of other cities by unnecessarily dividing these cities into two or more supervisorial districts (Plan 1 divides Thousand Oaks into three districts and Moorpark into two districts, and Plan 2 divides Camarillo into three districts and Thousand Oaks into two districts); and

4. Would not create district boundaries that would be easily identifiable and understandable by Oxnard residents.

As to Plan 4, while substantially better in meeting the City Council's principles, Plan 4 would still unnecessarily divide the City of Port Hueneme into two supervisorial districts and would split the City's established Cabrillo neighborhood into two supervisorial districts.

As the Board of Supervisors considers these and potentially other draft supervisorial maps at the public hearings on October 19, 2021 and November 9, 2021, I trust that the Board of Supervisors will fully take into account the important principles required to be utilized as part of the redistricting process.
